In this workshop, we will offer strategies to improve boundaries between faculty and students, particularly via online communication. Forming healthy boundaries between instructors and students – and between students – makes the educational experience better for everyone. With the increase in online learning and digital communication (email, text, apps, etc.), creating and maintaining appropriate boundaries is even more valuable—and necessary. This can be challenging for both students and faculty. Poor interpersonal boundaries can interfere with learning, contribute to teacher burnout, and affect student retention. Faculty in disciplines such as the Humanities and Social Sciences are particularly vulnerable. These disciplines investigate areas of social life that can be emotionally charged, in ways we do not always understand in the moment. Class discussion can be fertile ground for boundary complications.

In Fall 2020, a course-based undergraduate research experience (CURE) was incorporated into all sections of General Chemistry I, the first-semester chemistry course for science and engineering majors. CUREs are high impact practices for increasing student learning and retention, including underrepresented students in STEM. Here, I discuss how this CURE was incorporated into the course and how the students responded to this experience. This work was partially supported by the ICCFA Dr. Joseph T. Cipfl Faculty Research Grant.

4c2 *What Everyone Needs to Know About Professor Flexibility, Philosophy, and Student Completion*

This presentation is an overview of a two-year data project that collaborated with the college’s institutional research department to determine if changes in teaching style and course materials increased overall student completion, especially in historically underrepresented groups. Data sets were separated by age, sex, race, pell grants, and full- and part-time status. Data also included the completion rates of students who participated in TRIO services and developmental coursework. The data showed that changes in teaching style and course materials increased completion rates; the most considerable growth was among black men and women 25 years and older.

4d *Active Shooter Mitigation: Is Arming Faculty the Answer?*

Students cannot be comfortable in their learning environment if they don't feel safe. In this presentation I will examine the stressful and chaotic environment that exists during these events and the realities faced by responders. We will also examine the historical context of school shootings and the responses to them. Joe is a twenty-year veteran of campus law enforcement who experienced a school shooting firsthand. His background as a paramedic and emergency medical dispatcher will help provide perspective of what responders are seeing and thinking as they enter a school. Through this lens we will consider the question of whether or not arming employees is a good idea in the community college environment.

One of the standards in World Language (WL) learning is interpersonal communication. This standard promotes spontaneous and unrehearsed language use. One of the pitfalls of asynchronous online learning is that students are able to prepare their communications in advance, eliminating its spontaneity. This presentation offers an overview of a pilot study that integrated live speaking activities with native speakers and instantaneous oral assessments into two online Spanish courses. Ideas for implementation and preliminary data on student success will be shared.

6d *Using a HyFlex Model to Serve In-person and Online Students Synchronously*
